





A Young Girl with SCID Becomes an Advocate for Herself and Others

Seersha Sulack's story is an inspiration for families affected by 'bubble baby' disease

Seersha Sulack's childhood has been anything but ordinary.

For her first five years, hospital rooms replaced playgrounds and doctor visits stood in for playdates. Born with ADA-SCID — adenosine deaminase deficient severe combined immunodeficiency, or 'bubble baby' disease — she lacked a functioning immune system.

Despite constant medical care, Seersha's confidence never dimmed.

"Seersha is a firecracker. She speaks her mind and is really sweet," said Donald Kohn, MD, of the Eli and Edythe Broad Center of Regenerative Medicine and Stem Cell Research at UCLA.

"Her energy is always up," added her mother, Shayla Sulack. "She's never met a stranger that she didn't become friends with."

BLOOD SAMPLE TELLS THE STORY

Seersha was born Oct. 21, 2017, in a military hospital in Honolulu, Hawaii, the third child of the Sulack family.

A routine newborn blood test raised alarm when it showed she lacked T cells, a marker for SCID. The hospital geneticist sent her sample to UCLA Health, a national leader in immunodeficiency care. There, Manish Butte, MD, PhD, chief of Immunology, Allergy and Rheumatology, confirmed the diagnosis.

At six days old, Seersha and her mother were airlifted to Los Angeles on a military medical flight, the baby sealed in an incubator to avoid infection.

"It was terrifying to leave my husband and

two other children not knowing when they were going to see her again," Shayla recalled.

The family soon relocated to Tehachapi to be closer to UCLA Health and relatives. Doctors warned Seersha might not live to see her first birthday. But Dr. Kohn's pioneering work in gene therapy offered hope.

TREATMENT OPTIONS FOR A SEVERE DISEASE

Seersha's SCID was caused by inheriting two faulty copies of the ADA gene, which produces an enzyme essential for T cells.

"We had no idea we were carriers until we had Seersha," said Shayla.

"Before treatments existed, SCID was uniformly a fatal disease in infancy. Babies would die within the first year of life from infections," Dr. Kohn explained.

Today, two main therapies — bone marrow transplant and gene therapy — offer potential cures. A bone marrow transplant replaces defective stem cells with healthy ones from a compatible donor.

"If there is a sibling who is a perfect match and does not have SCID, the chance of a successful transplant is 90 to 95%," Dr. Kohn said.

But only 25% of siblings are perfect matches, and Seersha's family wasn't among them.

"My husband and I were only half matches, and our older children were not matches for her at all," Shayla recalled.

Dr. Kohn offered gene therapy as an alternative to give Seersha her best chance.

A Unique Approach to SCID

Gene therapy is a process that removes a patient's stem cells, inserts a normal ADA gene using a modified virus, and reinfuses the corrected cells. UCLA Health's program has saved the lives of more than 50 babies to date.

"We liked gene therapy for us, because we

didn't have to worry about rejection or anything else. If it didn't work, we could do other options," said Shayla. "The doctors were also really great about explaining this to Seersha. Because at the end of the day, she's the one living with it."

"If gene therapy was not available, Seersha would have had to match with an unrelated donor or a parent," Dr. Kohn added. "These treatments are much more complicated. They need more chemotherapy. They need immune suppression. So that would have been a harder road."

MOVING FORWARD

Though the process, medications and infusions were hard, Seersha met it with determination.

Her immune system began responding well, letting her experience the childhood she had missed — playing outside, exploring nature and school and trying softball.

"She's a huge advocate for herself. She's not shy. She just takes it all in stride," Shayla said. "And the fact that she gets to enjoy whatever everybody else does ... going to the beach or even going to the grocery store."

That spirit shined at Dodger Stadium on May 17, when seven-year-old Seersha threw out the ceremonial first pitch and met her favorite player, Mookie Betts — a dream once thought impossible.

"She has grown — you just see the maturation," Dr. Kohn added. "She was a baby when we treated her, and now she's become a young girl. It is a blessing to be able to improve people's lives."

Today, the Sulacks use their experience to help others.

"There's just this huge community of SCID parents, and so, that's all we do ... we try to

advocate for them to get them the treatments that they need," said Shayla.

Her advice: "It is a terrifying moment when your child is sick. You want to close the entire world out to protect your child, but accept the help that is there — because there is help and community."

"It is a very difficult road, but there's light at the end, as you can see with Seersha," Dr. Kohn said. "UCLA Health has been a leader in gene therapy for childhood diseases like this. The resources that we have — the transplant program and the laboratories that can process these cells — are unique. We are really one of the few places in the country that offer these treatments."

As the Sulacks prepare to move to Tennessee — recently welcoming a new baby — their gratitude to UCLA Health endures.

"We don't want to leave UCLA — we want UCLA to travel with us," Shayla said with a smile. "Seersha has been with the UCLA Health team for almost eight years. They just feel like family."

Walking Together for Hope: Cathay Bank's Journey of Compassion and Community



Interview with Dr. Dunson K. Cheng
Executive Chairman of the Board,
Cathay General Bancorp and Cathay Bank

Could you share a brief history of Cathay Bank's involvement with Walk for Hope?

Cathay Bank started participating in Walk for Hope in 2007. Since then, we have raised a total of over \$680,000 from 2007 to 2025. Our involvement has steadily increased, with more clients, team members, their families and friends joining us each year. We have organized internal fundraising events and encouraged donations from our broader community.

What inspired the initial decision to support this cause, and what continues to motivate Cathay Bank's team members and the Cathay Bank Foundation today?

My personal connection to City of Hope began when a loved one received exceptional care during a critical stage of her illness. I vividly remember the night she was in distress, Dr. Stephen J. Forman at City of Hope came to her aid immediately and provided such compassionate care. That experience left a lasting impression on me.

City of Hope is a unique and invaluable resource in our community and is nationally recognized for its cancer care and research. It's not just about treatment; it's about hope and healing. We feel that it was our responsibility to support and promote the hospital's work, especially within our community.

Moreover, several Cathay Bank team members and their families have also been directly affected by cancer. Their strength and resilience have inspired us to continue supporting this cause. Walk for Hope allows us to honor them and raise awareness about the life-saving work that City of Hope is doing every day.

In what ways has your organization contributed to Walk for Hope over the years—whether through donations, volunteer efforts, or other forms of support?

Our contributions have been multifaceted:

- **Fundraising:** Team members organize internal fundraising events and contribute personally. Clients, family, and friends also donate generously.
- **Participation:** Cathay team members, along with their families and clients, actively join the Walk each year.



- **Community Engagement:** We promote the event through signage and outreach. Some of our clients get involved as well; for example, one vendor at a local farmers market donates produce as an incentive, and another contributes baked goods to help raise awareness.

We strive to make this a community-wide effort, involving not just our team members but also our clients and business affiliates.

From your perspective, what has been the most memorable year or moment working with City of Hope?

2017. I had the honor of serving as the inaugural chairperson for the Walk for Hope Los Angeles that year. The event exceeded its \$1 million fundraising goal, with Team Cathay contributing \$260,000. We had 111 participants from our extended Cathay family.

On a personal level, there are several moments that stand out:

- **Alice Hu**, a long-time team member, participated in a walker last year, demonstrating incredible spirit and dedication.
- Another team member, who was diagnosed with cancer in her 30s, continues to join the Walk every year. Her presence is a powerful testament to the care she received.
- One of our current managers, **Nancy Tarr**, is a former patient of City of Hope.
- I've also had the privilege of connecting clients and team members to City of Hope for care, including a former employee whose mother battled breast cancer.



These stories remind us why we walk—because we're making a real difference.
